School:

Lost River Jr/Sr High School serves grades 7 -12 with a current enrollment of approximately 235 students. The school, which is part of the Klamath County School District in Southeastern Oregon, is located in rural farm country with students coming from the communities of Merrill and Malin. The student body is approximately 56% Hispanic and 44% Caucasian. The school provides free breakfast and lunch to all students under the School Meals Community Eligibility Provision, which allows schools with high poverty rates to provide free breakfast and lunch to all students.

Curriculum:

The academic program at Lost River is organized on a seven period day with 54-minute class periods. The school offers a variety of dual credit options through Klamath Community College and Oregon Institute of Technology. Current dual credit courses include: Writing 121, Writing 122, Speech 111, Math 105, Math 111, Crop Science 150, Animal Science 121, Welding 101, History 203, Business 101, Business 223, and Management Information Systems 107. In addition, students have the option of completing college online classes provided through Klamath Community College.

Grade Point Average:

GPA is computed using the above quality points to produce unweighted GPAs. A minimum of 24 credits are required for graduation.

Diploma Options:

Lost River Jr/Sr High School awards honor's diplomas in addition to standard diplomas and modified diplomas. The valedictorian and salutatorian must be honor's diploma recipients.

Post High School Placement:

- Approximately 50% of graduating seniors in 2017-2022 enrolled in a community college upon graduation.
- Approximately 30% of seniors in 2017-2022 matriculated directly to 4-year colleges.
- Approximately 20% of seniors in 2017-2022 selected work or military service.
