Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan

In order to best support students and families with the safest possible return to school for the 2021 school year, the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) has created an operational plan template to align guidance from the federal and state level in support of local decision-making and transparency of health and safety measures in the communities that school districts serve. The Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan serves the following purposes:

- 1) Replaces the Ready Schools, Safe Learners Operational Blueprint required under Executive Order 21-06; and
- 2) Meets the requirements for:
 - a. An operational plan required under <u>OAR 581-022-0106(4)</u>, while aligning the <u>CDC Guidance</u> on School Reopening with the <u>Ready Schools</u>, <u>Safe Learners Resiliency Framework for the 2021-22 School Year</u> (RSSL Resiliency Framework);
 - b. <u>Section 2001(i)(1)</u> of the ARP ESSER and the US Department of Education's <u>Interim Final Requirements</u> for Safe Return/Continuity of Services Plan; and
 - c. Communicable Disease Plan and Isolation Plan under OAR 581-022-2220 (Division 22 requirements).

As districts plan and implement the recommendations in ODE's RSSL Resiliency Framework, they will need to consider a continuum of risk levels when all recommendations cannot be fully implemented. For example, universal correct wearing of face coverings between people is one of the most effective preventive measures. However, there will be times when this is not possible based on a specific interaction or a physical space limitation, such as during meal times. It will be necessary to consider and balance the mitigation strategies described to best protect health and safety while ensuring full time in person learning.

ODE remains committed to the guiding principles introduced in spring of 2020 to generate collective action and leadership for efforts to respond to COVID-19 across Oregon. These principles are updated to reflect the current context:

- Ensure safety and wellness. Prioritizing basic needs such as food, shelter, wellness, supportive relationships and support for mental, social, and emotional health of students and staff.
- **Center health and well-being**. Acknowledging the health and mental health impacts of this past year, commit to creating learning opportunities that foster creative expression, make space for reflection and connection, and center on the needs of the whole child rather than solely emphasizing academic achievement.

- **Cultivate connection and relationship**. Reconnecting with one another after a year of separation can occur through quality learning experiences and deep interpersonal relationships among families, students and staff.
- **Prioritize equity**. Recognize the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on Black, American Indian/Alaska Native, and Latino/a/x, Pacific Islander communities; students experiencing disabilities; students living in rural areas; and students and families navigating poverty and homelessness. Apply an equity-informed, anti-racist, and anti-oppressive lens to promote culturally sustaining and revitalizing educational systems that support every child.
- Innovate. Returning to school is an opportunity to improve teaching and learning by iterating on new instructional strategies, rethinking learning environments, and investing in creative approaches to address unfinished learning.

(OAR 333-019-0010)	We follow very closely with our LPHA to determine the situations that require exclusion for staff and students regarding all communicable diseases.	When a staff or student has reason to suspect that they have been exposed to Covid, our protocol is that the District Nurse is contacted. Upon notification, the District Nurse follows contact tracing criteria supplied by our LPHA to determine next steps. The District Nurse contacts local public health with any questions or concerns as needed. District Nurse then contacts all exposed or suspected staff and or students to discuss the next steps. This includes days to quarantine, not quarantine and testing

KCSD may grant limited exceptions to requirements related to face coverings through individualized student-specific decisions made within the context of the IEP/IFSP or 504 team. We have reviewed our established IDEA and Section 504 processes to ensure adequate review and appropriate adaptation, accommodation, and/or modification of face covering requirements. Teams will include parents, students, school staff, school nurse, translation services, and additional participants, as needed to make the best decision for the student. Wherever possible, these teams will work to support a child's ability to meet these requirements rather than granting exception(s). KCSD will consult with our legal counsel regarding any concern about meeting IDEA and ADA laws.

Updates to this Plan

To remain in compliance with ARP ESSER requirements, school districts must regularly, but no less frequently than every six months (taking into consideration the timing of significant changes to CDC guidance on reopening schools), review, and as appropriate, revise its Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan.
